Harvey, often using machines also developed through ingenuity and industrial know-how; And as I looked at the brightening sky, I recalled what William Falk, the editor of

THE WEEK magazine, wrote about the August 21 eclipse, how it was:

"a reminder that we are passengers on a rock swinging through the solar system in a celestial dance choreographed by forces beyond our ken and our control. Awe is an uplifting emotion. It is good to feel small, to sense how brief and fragile our lives are in astronomical terms, to see that beyond the mundane lies a great mystery.

... This week, a great darkness fell upon America, and it was easy to understand why eclipses terrified the ancients, who saw them as portents of doom. But then the sun returned, advising us: Light defeats darkness. This too shall pass."

Light defeats darkness, love wins out against hate. That's the hope of the Gospel, and sometimes we need the simple tinkling of chimes to remind us of that.

A MINUTE FOR MISSION – TERRI BACON



Missions are a key part of our ministry at EGPC. Locally, we continue to support the food bank with both dollars and food donations Grocery bags of food are collected every Communion Sunday then delivered to the food bank. We also support HART/WINS, helping local people who are homeless. This year, we will once again participate in the Elk Grove ecumenical Share A Sole project, helping needy school kids with a new pair of shoes

We participate in Presbytery missions with quarterly donations of \$750.00 and participate in all four denomination offerings: One Great Hour of Sharing, Pentecost, Peace, and Christmas Joy. That money is forwarded to the denomination for mission programs. We are able to retain a portion of the Pentecost and Peace offerings for our own designated projects. This year we used our portion of the Pentecost offering to help provide the school supply boxes mentioned above. We are looking into using the money we retain from the Peace offering to help with a kindergarten in Armenia that is near to Pastor Vigen's heart!

Last year we supported Jeff and Christi Boyd, Presbyterian missionaries in Central Africa. They will be at our church on September 24, sharing their stories with us.

Our largest project is our mission to Honduras. In cooperation with University Presbyterian Church and the Presbytery College ministry, we have built two school buildings in Honduras. Seven people from our congregation, plus Dexter and Carol, have gone to Honduras to help with construction. As I write this, college students are currently in El Progreso, completing the second building which we started earlier in the year. Our congregation raised \$3,000 for each school building and also gave scholarship money to help some of the students with their first mission experience.

Our committee meets about 6 times a year. We always welcome new members!

WORSHIP NEWS -- JUDY LEWIS

THE REFORMATION: The Reformation, also referred to as the Protestant Reformation, was a schism from the Roman Catholic Church initiated by Martin Luther and continued by John Calvin, Huldrych Zwingly and other early Protestant reformers in 16th century Europe.



It is usually considered to have started with the publication of the Ninety-Five Theses by Luther on October 31, 1517. Luther began by criticizing the sale of indulgences, insisting that the Pope had no authority over purgatory and that the Catholic doctrine of the merits of the saints had no foundation in the gospel. The Protestant position, however, would come to incorporate doctrinal changes such as a complete reliance on the scripture as a source of proper

belief, and the belief that only faith, not good deeds, brings salvation. The core motivation behind these changes was theological, though many other factors played a part.

In honor of this 500th year, starting in September, we will have a series of Children's Sermons on some of the factors behind the Reformation.

BLESSING OF THE ANIMALS – SHARON CHILCOAT

Elk Grove Presbyterian Church will hold a "Blessing of the Animals" service on Saturday, October 7, 2017 at 2:00 p.m. in the parking lot in front of the church.



Animal blessing services were introduced by St. Francis of Assisi 800 years ago. He believed that

humans are only one of a myriad of God's creatures and all are blessed in the eyes of God. From Genesis 9: 8-11, "After the flood, God said to Noah, "I now establish my covenant with you and your descendants and with every living creature that was with you on the ark, the birds, the livestock and all the wild animals that came out of the ark with you, every living creature on earth." This is just one of many other biblical passages that show that God cares for all creation.

Animal blessing services are usually held in early October near the date of the death of St. Francis which was on October 3, 1226. Now many churches hold these services. St. Francis became the patron saint of animals.

You are invited to bring your animals to be blessed. Please be sure they are controlled and have them on leash or contained so there will be no "riot". The community of Elk Grove will be invited to participate with us as will the service animals of the police department.



I was born and raised in Shanghai, China. The country had been under communist regime since 1949. From that time until the mid-70s, China was quite isolated from the outside world except for contacts with Russia, Albania, Romania and some African countries. My parents became Christian prior to 1949. When I grew up, my mother often told me that one day she wanted to send me to the western world. It was an unthinkable thought because the country had a very weak economy, political turmoil, and everything was planned and controlled by the government. There was no chance to get out of the county. But, my mother kept her beliefs and had faith in God. In 1972, the U.S. and China reformed their diplomatic relationship. All of a sudden, the door started to open. It took several years of waiting and involved many procedures for me to come to America. When this happened, it was the beginning of a new life.

I have been very grateful for the opportunity to come to America. I started life in this country with \$40, which was the maximum amount allowed to be exchanged by Chinese government in the early 80s. All of a sudden, I became quite poor with many challenges ahead. At first I felt insecure and helpless. I started to rely on God once I became a Christian. While in college, I was very focused and I took school seriously. The tuition was provided by overseas family support at first. Toward the end of my junior year, I was informed that no funds would be available for my senior year. I was devastated. Obviously, my limited income of \$300 a month, which I received by working 24 hours a week on a work study program, would not solve the problem. Without further financial support, I would not be able to finish my education as wished. I decided to meet with school Dean. On the way to the Dean's office, I prayed for miracles. Dean Skinner kindly received me in his office and listened to my concerns. He then checked my grades and told me to wait. A few minutes later, he told me that the school had decided to grant me a one year tuitionfree scholarship. I was literally speechless with tears in my eyes. I know that God was behind me and had just given me a great gift. With his blessing, I graduated on time and with honors. Over the years, I have encountered many magic experiences with God. I have learned to keep my head up when things are low and to keep my head down in humility when things are at their peak. GOD IS THE MOST POWERFUL AND OUR SAVIOR. -- AMEN
